IV. Present Summary of MHSA Annual Update FY 2011/12	 Jayleen Richards provided an overview of the MHSA Annual Update FY 2011/12. The community program planning process, 30 day public posting, and public hearing was reviewed. Overall, MHSA annual allocations are decreasing since Fiscal Year (FY) 2009-10 and continue to decrease through FY 2012-13. MHSA Annual Update guidelines require a MHSA program to be reported as new if there is a 25% +/-change occurs. MHSA Full Service Partnerships will continue for each target age group: children, transition age youth, adults and older adults. Other MHSA programs will continue: Psychiatric 	 Questions were asked regarding funding and if funding was going to be cut to programs and contractors Answer is no, funding shortage was planned for and local reserves will be used to fill in the gaps. Question, will services or contracts be cut. Answer is no, because of the reserves, services will not be changed and contract amounts will not be amended.

Emergency Team, Foster Family/Bilingual Support, Wellness and Recovery Services, and Outreach & Engagement.

- The MHSA Annual Update reports a new program: Crisis Stabilization & Hospitalization Alternative Placement. During the Solano County Mental Health Strategic Planning in FY 2009-10, the community identified the need for crisis stabilization services.
- MHSA Workforce and Education Training Plan activities will continue as reported in the previous year.
 - Solano County Mental Health Continuum of Care contractors have hired six consumer staff members.
- MHSA Prevention and Early Intervention (PEI) programs will continue as reported in previous years.
- All Prevention and Early Intervention (PEI) programs were reported as "new" since the decrease in the PEI allocation was more 25%. Solano County Mental Health had created a multi-year financial plan for MHSA programs (and PEI) and anticipated the decrease in PEI funds in FY 2011-12. Contract amounts in FY 2011-12 will remain the amount stated in the contract.
- PEI will begin a community program planning process to update the current PEI strategic plan and issue a Request for Proposal in FY 2011-12 for services to begin in FY 2012-13.
- MHSA Technology: Submitting an Update to the MHSA FY 2009-10 Annual Update to request funds for Technology.
- Requesting about \$2.4 million to procure and launch an Electronic Health Record system in Solano County.

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	 One public comment was received about the decrease in funding amounts for PEI programs and would this impact contract amounts. The decrease in PEI funding amounts will not impact contract amounts. 	
V. Roundtable Discussion and MHSA Updates	 J. Richards provided an overview of the Governor's proposed budget, including redirection of MHSA funds for FY 2011-12 to fund EPSDT, Medi-Cal/Managed Care and AB 3632 services at the local level. In the long term, extension of current tax through ballot initiative would be used to fund these efforts. In FY 2011-12, MHSA is expected to funds=EPSDT, Medi-Cal/Managed Care and AB 3632 and local MHSA planning allocations. However, the MHSA funds fall short (about \$1 million in Solano County) of funding all of these efforts. State Loan Assumption program has had approximately 10 recipients that have received funding so far. Solano County has plans to begin a local program this next Fiscal Year. SouthPace Housing project (permanent supported housing) has been approved by DMH and CalHFA. It includes 92 units, of which MHSA has 10. Seven units will house families and three will be shared. Bliss Housing project is a five bedroom facility. CalHFA approval still pending for Bliss project. Heritage Commons in Dixon will submit an application soon. Older Adults were identified by attendees as needing more services and help. Older Adults are less likely to ask for the services that they need/require. MHSA Technology: an intent to award was issued for Netsmart to be the vendor for the Solano County

- contract will be in place later this year.
- Transitional Age Youth Collaborative; has two major strategies. 1. Spreadsheet with all information to track who is offering what services and for whom. This includes a standardized referral system. 2. Connect by 25 foster youth grant is going away in August. Discussion on how this program can be transferred to all youth.
- Caminar: Wellness and Recover Center is up and running. Older Adult Full Service Partnership has 18 older adults being served and provides a medical component. Supported housing, case management services are provided on-sight Solano County Continuum of Care has met once and plans to meet in April. The group is identifying the continuum of mental health services in Solano County, as well as the gaps in services.
- Area Agency on Aging has an upcoming training and additional trainings are scheduled for May is Mental Health Month.
- Faith in Action; works with homebound seniors with mental illness. Not critical cases. Volunteers are trained to go to the senior's houses for approximately 1 hour a week. Services include peer counseling, in home counseling and over the phone counseling. Services and frequency depends on volunteer availability. No volunteers in Rio Vista at this time.
- Vocational Rehabilitation provides vocational services to consumer and the partners, includes Caminar, Jobs Plus. The program serves consumers 18 and older. Plenty of room is available in this program- please send referrals.

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- California Brief Multi Cultural Scale Training
 (CBMCS) has trained over 200 county staff,
 contractor staff, and family and consumer members.
 30 people attended a 36 hour training to be a trainer
 and 9 people applied to be a trainer. Friday the train
 the trainer will be completed and ready for trainee's
 to receive certification.
- Upcoming Trainings and conferences include: Client Cultural Training, CASRA conference, Cal Network Conference, NAMI trainings and more to come.
- Solano County Office of Education: as of the end of February, 350 students have received support.
 Marked improvement in attendance, behaviors and test scores. Waiting for the STAR test's and scores to see if there is correlation between services and success tracking.
- National Alliance Mental Illness; NAMI Walks is May 25th. Flyers in the back. No registration fee to participate. 90% of the money goes back to your community.
- LaClinica: medical health provider. Does universal screening under Prevention and Early Intervention for at risk behaviors. Funds allow for training and support for staff and intervention/referrals for clients. A variety of groups are being offered.
- Community Access Resources and Education (CARE) Program: 32 community partners are doing referrals. 31 of 52 referrals are being seen by a psychiatrist. Clinic in Fairfield open all the time. Roaming clinics in Vacaville, Dixon, Vallejo and Rio Vista. Trained 45 individuals in Mental Health First Aide.

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• CARE serves uninsured population. If you are not sure, send a referral, as they will screen all referrals received.
