About AOT

Laura's Law, also known as Assisted Outpatient Treatment (AOT) is a state law that allows for court-ordered treatment of those with severe and persistent mental illness. AOT is a civil (not criminal) legal procedure. Laura's Law must be adopted by the Board of Supervisors of a particular county to take advantage of the benefits.

In January of 2019, the Solano County Board of Supervisors approved the implementation of Laura's Law in Solano County.



What does AOT help with?

- Services are first offered voluntarily if the person is willing to accept help
- AOT provides oversight by a Judge when needed to encourage compliance
- AOT cannot force
 medication

AOT links to appropriate case management teams that provide:

- mental health & substance use services
- access to primary health care
- help with employment & housing
- assistance with benefits & food stamps
- peer mentoring and family support

Who can Request AOT?



- Immediate adult family member
- Adults residing with individual
- Director of treating agency, organization, facility, or hospital
- Treating licensed mental health professional
- Peace officer, parole or probation officer supervising the individual



Who Qualifies for AOT?



- Solano County resident, minimum of 18 years of age
- Clinical determination that the person is unlikely to survive safely in the community without supervision
- Person's condition is substantially deteriorating
- Person has been offered chance to participate in development of their treatment plan for services and continues to fail to become involved
- Person has a history of a lack of participation in mental health program that have resulted in either 2 or more hospitalizations in the last 36 months, or have one attempt to cause harm to self or others in the last 48 months
- Person is likely to benefit from AOT services
