Review MAPP Process and Healthy Solano Steering Committee	Meileen provided a brief review of the Mobilizing for Action through Planning and Partnerships (MAPP) process: Why is Solano County conducting yet another Health Assessment on top of all the assessments already being done? The primary reason is preparation for Public Health Accreditation. By the end of the MAPP process, Solano County will have a comprehensive Community Health Assessment and a Community Health Improvement Plan, which are two of the pre-requisites for applying for Public Health Accreditation. Other beneficial results that will come out of completing the MAPP process are: • a stronger, more robust Public Health System • strengthening of new and existing partnerships • community ownership and engagement in the Community Health Improvement Plan • reduced duplication of efforts (the goal is to compile a Community Health Assessment that everyone in the Public Health System can use) • major progress towards a healthier Solano County Progress with MAPP phases, so far: • Organizing (done)
