Medi-Cal Adult Expansion in 2024

Starting January 1, 2024, Medi-Cal will be expanding their full scope coverage to undocumented adults between ages 26-49 years old, regardless of immigration status.

Applying or using Medi-Cal will not affect your immigration status. Full Medi-Cal covers doctor visits, prescribed medications, vision care/eyeglasses, mental health care, vaccines, dental care, emergency services, and referrals to specialist.

For City Boards and Commissions, except for the Commission on Culture & the Arts, McCune Collection, Surveillance Advisory Board, and the Participatory Budgeting Steering Committee, all appointed members must complete and file a Statement of Economic Interests, Form 700, within 30 days of appointment.

All City Board and Commission members must complete AB 1234 Ethics training and file a Certificate of Completion within 30 days of appointment.

In most instances, to be eligible for appointment, applicants must be residents of the City of Vallejo. Information regarding the duties of each board and commission and specific criteria for appointment may be found within each application. With some exceptions, appointments are typically for a term of 4 years. Interviews with the City Council will be held in June/early July. Specific dates will be announced at a later date. Applicants must attend the interview to be considered for appointment on a committee or commission.

Loma Vista Farm seeks help paying vet bills

For a few years, Loma Vista Farm alpaca – Calvin – gave thousands of memories to its community visitors. Now the venue is asking that same community for help.

Nearly two years after Calvin was shot by someone with a pellet gun, the farm had to put down the 5-year-old alpaca on Nov. 27 at UC Davis due to the animal not being able to stand the pain anymore.

However, in the venue's attempt to save Calvin after being shot, the veterinarian bills have gone extremely high. According to Loma Vista Farm longtime farmer Rita LeRoy, the bills have reached nearly \$6,000 for Calvin alone in the past month.

Need Help Paying Your Energy Bill? These Programs Can Help



This winter, colder weather and darker skies may cause your energy bill to climb. Did you know our local electricity provider, MCE, can help keep these costs down? Take advantage of these tips and tricks to save with small changes at home, and see if you qualify for any discount or bill relief programs.

Tips and Tricks:

- Don't use big electric appliances between 4-9
 p.m., when electricity costs more. Small changes like doing laundry in the morning, preheating your home early in the day, and using fewer lights can make a big difference in your bill.
- Consider switching to energy-efficient holiday lighting. Holiday lights use 65 kilowatt-hours a month on average. That's almost as much as your refrigerator! Switch to LED and solar-powered options to save on your bill.
- Use timers and smart-strips. Electronics draw electricity any time they're plugged in, even when not in use! Using the on-off switch on a smart-strip outlet and putting lighting on timers to turn on and off automatically can help dramatically. It's estimated that these "vampire" appliances represent up to 10% of your annual energy usage.

Bill Savings Programs:

- <u>California Alternate Rates for Energy (CARE)</u> provides discounts of 35% on electricity and 20% on gas costs for income-qualifying homes.
- <u>Family Electric Rate Assistance (FERA)</u> offers an 18% monthly electric bill discount for income-qualifying households of 3 or more people.
- Medical Baseline Allowance offers savings for residents with a qualifying medical device or medical condition and extra notifications in advance of a Public Safety Power Shutoff.

Late Payment and Debt Relief:

- The <u>Arrearage Management Plan</u> offers debt-forgiveness up to \$8,000 to customers who have fallen behind on monthly bills. Customers must be enrolled in the <u>CARE or</u> <u>FERA</u> programs and be 90 days past due on at least \$500 of their energy bill.
- The Relief for Energy Assistance Through Community
 <u>Help</u> program offers a one-time energy bill credit up to
 \$300 when a sudden hardship occurs and households
 need additional support.
- The <u>Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program</u> offers up to \$3,000 in assistance with energy costs in addition to <u>free energy efficiency upgrades</u>.

Kaiser Permanente's new Community Health Care Program



This month, Kaiser
Permanente launched
the Community Health Care

<u>Program</u> (CHCP) in California for people who do not have access to any other health coverage. Individuals do not need to be U.S. citizens to qualify.

CHCP members will get the Kaiser Permanente Platinum 90 HMO plan. Monthly premiums for comprehensive coverage are subsidized, and members do not have to pay copays for out-of-pocket costs for most care.

The deadline to apply for CHCP is January 31, 2024, and space is limited.

ADRC Solano received "Designation" Status

The Aging and Disability Resource Connection of Solano has received full "Designation" status.

For the past 1 ½ years the Independent Living Resources of Solano and Contra Costa Counties and Napa/Solano Area Agency on Aging have been building the local ADRC – an entity to connect older adults and adults with disabilities with support services.

Core Services include:

- Transition Services from hospital to home connecting to services such as transportation, food, or caregiving
- Enhanced Information and Referral—warm referrals to needed services
- Short Term Case Management together, creating case plans and supporting people through their plan
- Long Term Service and Support Options Counseling informing people of the different options and supports available and assisting with the connections

Solano Public Health's Don't Think Know Program

Solano Public Health has launched a new program, Don't Think Know (DTK), a free Sexually Transmitted Infection (STI) testing resource that is now available in Solano County.

DTK is a free and confidential home test kit for vaginal chlamydia and gonorrhea infections. The free home test kit program is currently available to young women, girls, transmen, and any person with a vagina who is between 12 to 24 years of age and living in Solano County.

It is ideal for those who prefer testing at home instead of visiting a clinic. DTK serves as a reliable option for remotely accessing health information and guidance, ensuring seamless and efficient care in the privacy and comfort of your home or wherever you feel comfortable! Link21 Online Open House

There's one week left until Link21's Online Open House closes on December 15 so head over to <u>Link21OpenHouse.com</u> and join the conversation.

Conveniently participate anytime from your desktop or mobile device to learn how riders and communities across Northern California will benefit from a more connected BART or Regional Rail network that includes a new crossing between Oakland and San Francisco.

Based on your input and ongoing analysis, Link21 will identify a preliminary Project for recommendation to the BART and Capitol Corridor Boards of Directors in early 2024. The preliminary Project will name the specific train technology (BART or Regional Rail) within the new crossing, plus options for further study such as station locations and alignment.

Link21 is a long-range transportation program sponsored by the San Francisco Bay Area Rapid Transit District (BART) and the Capitol Corridor Joint Powers Authority (Capitol Corridor) to transform the train network serving the 21-county Northern California Megaregion which includes the greater San Francisco

Bay area, the Monterey Bay area, the Sacramento area and the Northern San Joaquin Valley.

Fairfield Forward 2050 City Council Study Session: Preferred Plan



On December 19, the Fairfield City Council will hold a study session on the General Plan Preferred Plan. The Preferred Plan communicates the community's vision for how the City will grow and develop over the next 25+ years and provides the foundation for more detailed policies.

The Council has held six study sessions over the past 22 months on the Preferred Plan and provided direction at the meeting on September 12. At the December 19 session, the Council will be asked to confirm direction of the Preferred Plan guiding policies and provide any additional ideas or suggestions to be reflected in the General Plan document, which will be developed in the coming months.

Point-In-Time Count 2024 Volunteer recruitment



The Community Action Partnership Solano Joint Powers Authority is looking for volunteers to help with the Point-In-Time (PIT) count next January. The PIT count is a count of unsheltered people experiencing homelessness on a single night in January.
