Venus Williams and Serena Williams

Taught by their father on the dilapidated public courts of Compton, California, Venus and Serena Williams became world champions and Olympic gold medalists. While breaking barriers for female athletes of color, the dynamic partners and rivals ushered a new era of power and athleticism in women's professional tennis.

Despite experiencing significant racism in a sport not known for diversity, elder sister Venus gained attention for her power serves and groundstrokes, becoming the first African American woman to be ranked No. 1 in the modern tournament era. She pushes for equal prize money from both the French Open and Wimbledon. Serena – who has said that Venus is “the only reason the Williams sisters exist” – has since surpassed her sister and now owns 23 Grand Slam singles titles, the most by any man or woman in modern tournament era. She is widely considered the greatest women's tennis player of all time.

Cesar Chavez: An American labor leader



Cesar Chavez, born March 31, 1927, Yuma, Arizona, U.S.—died April 23, 1993, San Luis, Arizona, was an organizer of migrant American farmworkers and a cofounder with Dolores Huerta of the National Farm Workers Association in 1962. Chavez, who was a farm laborer himself, grew up in a family of Mexican American descent. After his parents lost their farm during the Great Depression, the family moved to California, where they became migrant workers. He lived in a succession of migrant camps and attended school sporadically.

After two years in the U.S. Navy during World War II, Chavez returned to migrant farmwork in Arizona and California. His initial training as an organizer was provided by the Community Services Organization (CSO) in California, a creation of Saul Alinsky's Industrial Areas Foundation. In 1958 Chavez became general

director of the CSO, but he resigned four years later to cofound the NFWA. In September 1965 he began leading what became a five-year strike by California grape pickers and a nationwide boycott of California grapes that attracted liberal support from throughout the country. Subsequent battles with lettuce growers, table-grape growers, and other agribusinesses generally ended with the signing of bargaining agreements. In 1966 the NFWA merged with an American Federation of Labor – Congress of Industrial Organizations (AFL-CIO) group to form the United Farm Workers Organizing Committee. In 1971 this organization became the United Farm Workers (UFW).

By the late 1960s the Teamsters Union had recognized an opportunity in Chavez’s success. It entered the fields as a rival organizer, signing up farmworkers for its own union. In 1972 Chavez sought assistance from the AFL-CIO, which offered help against the inroads being made by the Teamsters. After much conflict—both in the fields and in the courts—the UFW signed a peace pact with the Teamsters in 1977, giving the UFW the sole right to organize farmworkers and field-workers.

Traffic advisory



Caltrans is scheduled to alternately close eastbound and westbound State Route 37 (SR-37) on four consecutive weekends starting the weekend of Friday, April 12. During the 55-hour weekend full highway closures, Caltrans will perform major pavement repair work on eastbound and westbound SR-37 between Solano and Sonoma counties. One traffic direction on SR-

37 will be worked on at a time. Detours will be in effect. All work is weather dependent.

Weekend closure on WB SR-37 is scheduled on the weekend of **April 12 & April 19**. WB SR-37 will be closed and traffic detoured beginning at the WB SR-37 Connector Off-ramp to SR-29 in Vallejo.


Closures will start **Friday April 12 at 9 p.m.** and conclude on the following **Monday, April 15 at 4 a.m.**

The following weekend, closures will start **Friday, April 19 at 9 p.m.** and conclude the following **Monday, April 22 at 4 a.m.**

WB SR-37 DETOUR:

Motorists traveling westbound on SR-37 will need to exit right onto northbound SR-29 (Sonoma Blvd) in Vallejo and continue on NB SR-29 (Broadway) in American Canyon to SR-29/SR-12; then turn left and continue on SR-12/SR-121 (Carneros Hwy/Fremont Dr); turn left on SR-121 (Arnold Drive) and make a right back onto WB SR-37.

EB SR-37 DETOUR:



Weekend closures on eastbound (EB) SR-37 is scheduled on the weekend of **April 26 & May 3**. EB SR-37 will be closed and traffic detoured beginning at the NB SR-121 (Sears Point) in Sonoma.

Closures will start **Friday April 26 at 10 p.m.** and conclude on the following **Monday April 29 at 5 a.m.**

The following weekend, closures will start **Friday, May 3 at 10 p.m.** and conclude on the following **Monday, May 6 at 5 a.m.**

EB SR-37 DETOUR:

Motorists traveling eastbound on SR-37 will need to exit left onto northbound SR-121 in Sonoma; Make a right on SR-12/SR-121 (Carneros Hwy) and continue; Right on SR-12/SR-29; Enter left for the connector loop Off-ramp back to EB SR-37.

Please note that all work is weather dependent. The weekends of May 3 and May 10 are scheduled as contingency if any scheduled work is delayed or postponed.



5 Tips to Stop Scammers

1. Double-check the source of "government" communications

The Social Security Administration, IRS, VA, Medicare and California Franchise Tax Board never threaten criminal action, demand an immediate payment or ask for personal information. If a letter from one of these agencies looks suspicious, call their official phone number to verify.

2. Watch for fake social media identities & "sweetheart" scams

It's easy to create a fake social media account. All a criminal needs is a photo and a name to replicate someone's identity on Facebook, Instagram, Twitter and dating sites. Then, they can send a message to all your friends asking for money, a donation—or even a date! Always check with friends via phone to verify their identity and take new relationships slow before sharing intimate information or money.

3. Monitor your finances and protect your Power of Attorney

While we all want to trust our family and friends, some have been caught withdrawing from loved ones' bank accounts or filing fraudulent power of attorney documents. Check your bank accounts for suspicious charges often and report them to the bank or police.

4. Bring skepticism to every prize or investment offer

If it's too good to be true, it probably is. If you've been offered a "rare investment opportunity" or "won a big prize," be skeptical. No legitimate sweepstake requires you to pay any funds up front—prizes are always paid on your tax return. All investments hold risks, but those promising "huge returns" are often scams.

5. Be wary of "urgent" notices that claim something has been "compromised"

If an email, text or pop-up notification on your computer asks you to click a link to remove a virus or secure a bank account, double-check the communication is real.

If an email, it should come from your bank's domain (i.e., @chase.com) not a personal email address (@yahoo.com) or a lookalike (@chase.net). Don't respond or click on a teased link. Instead, call your bank to follow up.

If a pop-up, close it or your browser, then access your anti-virus software directly to follow up. Most importantly, never share your Social Security number or credit card information with anyone.

Court seeks jurors for 2024- 2025 Civil Grand Jury

The Honorable Alesia Jones, Presiding Judge of the Superior Court of Solano County, announces the Court is seeking volunteers to serve as jurors on the 2024-2025 Civil Grand Jury.

Residents who have lived in the county for one year, are a United States citizen and are 18 years of age or older, may apply for service. The grand jury is an historic institution and serves an important role in our society. It is sometimes referred to as the “watchdog” of the community. It functions as an arm of the judicial branch of government and operates under the authority of the Solano Superior Court.

The grand jury investigates and reports on the operations, accounts, and records of local government and has the power to investigate citizen complaints about local government. Empowered by the judicial branch, the grand jury is a fact-finding body that develops meaningful solutions to a wide range of governmental issues, thereby facilitating positive change in the community.

Although this is primarily a civic responsibility, grand jurors are paid a \$20 per diem and are paid mileage reimbursement for each authorized meeting.

Internship for high school students



Bay Area high school students are invited to apply to the [Norman Mineta Bay Area Summer Academy](#), a five-week paid internship

with MTC, the Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG), the Bay Conservation and Development Commission (BCDC) and the Bay Area Air Quality Management District (Air District).

The program kicks off at the Bay Area Metro Center on July 8, 2024, and over the course of the subsequent five weeks, students will learn how regional agencies deal with issues like environmental justice, housing and transportation equity, community health, and social justice. To apply for the Bay Area Summer Academy, students must:

- Live and attend high school in the Bay Area.
- Be at least 16 years old.
- Have completed the ninth grade by July 2024.
- Be able to attend online and in-person seminars and present on a topic related to the seminars.
- Have the permission of a parent or guardian to participate if the student is under 18.

Enrollment is limited, and selections will emphasize a diversity of perspectives from students across the Bay Area. Grade point averages are not considered.

Notice of Public Availability of 2023 Refinery Flare Minimization Plan Annual Updates

The Bay Area Air Quality Management District is releasing the 2023 Flare Minimization Plan (FMP) Annual Updates for public review and comment. The five Bay Area refineries prepared these plans subject to [Regulation 12, Rule 12: Flares at Refineries](#).



Under Regulation 12-12, each FMP Annual Update must include:

- New prevention measures identified during investigations of flaring events that occurred during the period July 1, 2022 – June 30, 2023;
- A description of the prevention measures previously taken or currently planned to reduce flare emissions at the refinery;
- Commitment to implement all new feasible prevention measures expeditiously; and
- A 30-day public comment review period

The plan updates are now available for review on the Air District's [Flare Minimization Plans](#) web page.

The deadline to submit public comments regarding the 2023 FMP Annual Updates is **April 8, 2024**.

Be sure to identify which refinery, or refineries, your comment is applicable to.

After consideration of public comments received, the Air District will evaluate each refinery's Flare Minimization Plan Annual Update to determine whether it meets the requirements of Regulation 12-12 and will take final action in accordance with the regulation.

The [CalMatters College Journalism Network](#) is hiring fellows for its 2024-2025 cohort, which begins mid-August and runs through May.

Fellows devote an average of 10-15 hours per week to the remote fellowship, with a flexible schedule and a stipend of \$1200 per month. 2024 Congressional Art Competition



Each spring, a nationwide high school art competition is sponsored by the Members of the U.S. House of Representatives. The Congressional Art Competition is a great way to showcase our students' creative efforts and provide recognition for the artistic talent throughout our district. **The 2024 deadline to submit is April 19th at 5:00 PM PT.** Submissions must be dropped off at either Congressman John Garamendi's Fairfield or Vallejo district offices

before 5 PM on Friday, April 19. To drop off your artwork at Garamendi's Richmond office, please call 510-620-1001 to arrange a time to do so.

The following is a summary of the Congressional Art Competition rules:

Artwork must be two-dimensional. Each framed artwork can be no larger than 26 inches high, 26 inches wide, and 4 inches deep. If your artwork is selected as the winning piece, it must arrive in Washington, DC, framed. Even when framed, it must still measure no larger than the above maximum dimensions. No framed piece should weigh more than 15 pounds.

Accepted mediums for the two-dimensional artwork are as follows:

- Paintings: oil, acrylics, watercolor, etc.
- Drawings: colored pencil, pencil, ink, marker, pastels, charcoal (It is recommended that charcoal and pastel drawings be fixed.)
- Collages: must be two dimensional
- Prints: lithographs, silkscreen, block prints
- Mixed Media: use of more than two mediums such as pencil, ink, watercolor, etc.
- Computer-generated art
- Photographs

Each entry must be original in concept, design, and execution and may not violate U.S. copyright laws. Any entry that has been copied from an existing photo or image (including a painting, graphic, or advertisement) that was created by someone other than the student is a violation of the competition rules and will not be accepted.

Work entered must be in the original medium (that is, not a scanned reproduction of a painting or drawing). Artwork must be

the creation of a single student. Students may not collaborate on an entry.

The 8th district includes parts of the Bay Area counties of Contra Costa County and Solano County, including the cities of Vallejo, Fairfield, Richmond and parts of Martinez.

Solano College Theatre (SCT) is pleased to announce its spring musical *Anything Goes* directed by SCT's Artistic Director Christine Mani.


