

The California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) has scheduled several projects over the coming weekends which will close sections of freeways in our area.

There are weekend closures on Eastbound I-80 tentatively scheduled on the weekends of **August 4**, **and August 18**. EB I-80 will be closed and traffic detoured beginning at the EB I-80/State Route-4 interchange in Hercules. Closures will start **Fridays at 9pm.** and conclude on the following **Mondays at 5am** 

A 104-hour full highway closure of westbound I-80 is scheduled on Labor Day weekend starting **Thursday**, **August 31 at 9pm** and concluding **at 5am on Tuesday**, **September 5**, **2023**. WB I-80 will be closed and traffic detoured beginning at the WB I-80/I-780 interchange in Vallejo.

Motorists traveling eastbound on I-80 will need to exit onto eastbound SR-4 in Hercules and continue on EB SR-4 to Northbound I-680. Motorists can use NB I-680 to reach I-80 in Fairfield or use WB I-780 to access the Benicia and Vallejo areas. Cummings Skyway between SR-4 and I-80 will also be open for motorists heading to the Crockett area.

Motorists traveling westbound on I-80 at I-780 (Curtola Pkwy) will need to exit onto eastbound I-780 in Vallejo and continue on EB I-780 to SB I-680. Motorists can use SB I-680 to reach WB SR-4, WB SR-24 or WB I-580 to access central and south Bay Area destinations.

You can now get a ride to and from your doctor visits at no charge As a Kaiser Permanente Medicare health plan member, you can get a ride to and from your appointments at no cost. Your plan covers up to 24 oneway trips (50 miles per trip) per calendar year.

The City of Benicia has released a Subsequent Draft Housing Element for 2023-2031 for review by interested members of the public. The Subsequent Draft Housing Element incorporates revisions requested by the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) in their response letter dated April 4, 2023. Two versions of the Subsequent draft are posted: a clean copy and a markup copy dated June 2023. The mark-up copy shows revisions to the Adopted Housing Element in blue highlight; other tracked changes are earlier revisions in the prior submittal to HCD.

# **Exploring the Future of Electric Rates in California webinar**

Assembly Bill 205 (2022) removed the existing cap on fixed charges for residential electric rates, required the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) to consider a tiered fixed charge option based on income (so lower-income ratepayers receive higher savings) by July 2024, and to move forward with creating a framework to enable demand flexibility. Thus far, the CPUC has approved new Rate Design Principles—updating longstanding precedents—and crafted principles for Demand Flexibility, setting the foundation for the proceeding to move forward.

Following the creation of Guiding Principles, the CPUC solicited proposals for the first version of a residential fixed charge that includes: which rate

components should be included in a fixed charge, how many income brackets are appropriate, and how to implement such a fixed charge. The Clean Coalition advanced a reasonable and easy-to-implement fixed charge; almost every other party proposed a significantly more expensive fixed charge that would require major changes to implement. Given that electric rates are unaffordable—and still skyrocketing—in California, it is important to understand the future of rate design and what the path to electrification looks like.

The webinar will take place on Tuesday, August 15 from 11am to noon.

This webinar will cover:

- The background of the Demand Flexibility proceeding and why a Fixed Charge is being proposed based on personal income.
- The Clean Coalition's modest fixed fee proposal and the methodology behind it.
- Why rates should primarily be volumetric in nature and what the main drivers of increasing rates are.
- How high fixed charge proposals would result in net losses for most residential customers and upend the incentive to conserve energy.
- The key correlation between rates and electrification; improper rate reform could render electrification financially infeasible.


## Fairfield 101 Civic Academy returns September 7th

Attendees will receive detailed information on the current state of the CDBG Program and technical assistance to prepare them to apply for CDBG funding with the City of Fairfield. The California Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC) is sending out this Community Update to let the community know about Phase 2 of the investigation and proposed cleanup at the

700 Parc on Main Site (Site), Operable Unit 2 (OU2). The Site consists of multiple Operable Units (OU); OU1 North, located at 701 Catherine St, OU1 South, located at 325 Wilson Street and OU2 located at 207 McClellan Street, Vacaville.

In April 2022, an environmental investigation was completed at the site and found lead and low levels of organochlorine pesticides in surface soils at various locations across the site. The contaminants of potential concern for OU-2 are lead, chlordane, dieldrin, dichlorodiphenyldichloroethylene (DDE), and/or dichlorodiphenyltrichloroethane (DDT). The contamination likely comes from the demolition of residential structures and buildings with lead paint and pest control activities. The proposed cleanup would include the excavation/removal of lead-contaminated soil from the site to allow for residential and commercial redevelopment.

Following environmental cleanup, the site is planned for development of a pedestrian oriented, mixed-use neighborhood. Historically used for agricultural purposes and cattle grazing, the site was developed as early as 1908 and has been used for commercial and residential purposes. Past commercial uses of the Site include a delicatessen, grocery store, feed store, automotive repair shop,

and a construction laydown yard. Beginning in the 1990's buildings on the site were demolished. By 2006, the site was mostly vacant land.

Devices are limited to older adults (60+) or adults with permanent disabilities who are at risk and do not have access to a device. Those interested should contact the Aging and Disability Resource Connection at (707) 200-7116. Callers need to leave a message so an intake coordinator can return the call and administer a brief intake questionnaire to determine if the person is eligible to receive a device. Devices are reserved for the most at-risk individuals as numbers are limited.

The Solano Transportation Authority (STA), in partnership with Commute with Enterprise, presents the Solano Mobility Express Vanpool Pilot Program, traveling weekdays between the Vacaville Transportation Center and Sacramento, and between the Dixon Park & Ride and Sacramento.

There is a limited time introductory offer of \$50 for a monthly pass (regularly \$90) for riders traveling between Sacramento and Vacaville or Dixon. Solano Express Blue Line riders starting their commute in Vacaville or Dixon who purchased a monthly pass in the last six months and commute to Sacramento are eligible for the introductory price of \$50.Solano Express Blue Line riders who purchase a monthly pass and start their commute south of Vacaville can transfer in Vacaville to the Solano Mobility Express Vanpool for free.

The final 3-Year Plan will be presented to the Solano County Board of Supervisors in August 22, 2023 for approval before being submitted to the Mental Health Services Oversight

and Accountability Commission and the Department of Health Care Services.



# Benicia PD town hall meeting on automated license plate reader system



Benicia Police Chief Mike Greene will provide a public presentation on the automated license plate reader system at **6pm.**, **Thursday**, **August 10**. Chief Greene and his staff will share the successes and results of the

Automated License Plate Reader technology, its impact on crime in the city, and future plans.

In May 2021, the Benicia City Council approved the purchase and installation of 45 Automated License Plate Readers (ALPRs) within the city limits. ALPR software is a technology that uses cameras to automatically read license plate characters and other identifying characteristics of a vehicle (the vehicle make, model, color and unique identifiers). The cameras capture license numbers and transmits plate data to a database, which can run a check for stolen vehicles, Amber Alerts, Silver Alerts, missing persons and wanted people.

**Tuesday night, August 1**, was National Night Out. I attended events in Fairfield/Cordelia and Benicia. I enjoy being outside with the community. The weather was perfect. The highlight for me is always listening to the kids and how much they enjoy the fire truck.

Thursday, August 3, I spent the day with the Solano Resource Conservation District and the in-service training for the teachers. Many of you have read the articles in my newsletter about the free programs for students to take them out in the field, to teach them about our environment. Thursday was spent taking a boat ride on Lake Berryessa and learning about the different water projects and how water is moved around the state. The lake is here because decades ago, community members realized that having a staple water source would allow agriculture to grow in Solano County. Compared to last year, the Lake is at least 80% full. Tuesday, the Board of Supervisors heard from our agriculture commissioner about the latest crop and livestock report. The gross value of the agriculture production in 2022 was \$390,881,000. The ag commissioner is also responsible for pest prevention, issuing certificates for ag commodities to be exported to 41 countries, certified farmers' markets and weights and measures.
